and therefore, in so far as a sign is indeterminate, it is vague, unless it is

expressly or by a well-understood convention rendered general. [—]

Perhaps a more scientific pair of definitions would be that anything is *general* in so far as the principle of excluded middle does not apply to it and is *vague* in so

far as the principle of contradiction does not apply to it.
