**Term:** Methodeutic

**Quote:** ...the third branch of logic which specially considers how inquiries are to be ordered and arranged is by Plato and Aristotle and all their followers, and by English logicians generally, called *Method*. But in order to distinguish this from the concrete and more usual meaning of the same word *method*, I prefer to call it *Methodeutic*. The German logicians call it *methodology*; but methodeutic is a better word from every point of view.
