Quote:	I had observed that the most frequently useful division of signs is by trichotomy into firstly Likenesses, or, as I prefer to say, <i>Icons</i> , which serve to represent their objects only in so far as they resemble them in themselves; secondly, <i>Indices</i> , which represent their objects independently of any resemblance to them, only by virtue of real connections with them, and thirdly <i>Symbols</i> , which represent their objects, independently alike of any resemblance or any real connection, because dispositions or factitious habits of their interpreters insure their being so understood.
