**Term:** Would-be

**Quote:** ...by a *Habit* I shall mean a character of anything, say of B, this character consisting in the fact that under circumstances of a certain kind, say A, B *would* tend to be such as is signified by a determinate predicate, say C. The same thing might be more briefly expressed by saying that I call any *real* "Would-be" a *habit* of the subject of such predication, but by stating the matter more fully I bring into prominence the fact that a "Would-be" is a relation between three objects, A, B, and C.
